

Betsy joined the Socialist Workers Party in 1972 as a well-respected fighter in the labor movement and for Mexican-American and Black rights going back to the 1950s. In 1968, she supported the SWP presidential campaign of Fred Halstead and Paul Boutelle.

In 1978, Betsy joined the SWP's campaign to get into industry to help build fighting unions and win workers to the party. She was 58 years old. She was known for promoting the SWP program, and circulating the party's newspaper the *Militant* and Pathfinder books. In 1983, the party and the Phoenix and Tucson branches turned to the Phelps Dodge copper strike. Betsy was a member of the Phoenix branch.








Mass protests erupted in Los Angeles in 1992 following the acquittal of the cops who brutally beat Rodney King.
