Last night's boom came at 1:10 a.m.

Police and sheriff's depart. said. ment officials said they re-ceived 50 to 60 calls about the strange burst of sound, the phones beginning to jingle with inquiries about 1:15 a.m.

Other residents said the blast shook their windows.

Most of the calls came from homes north of Broadway to the city limits and east of Park out into the county.
