## Study Of UFOs Is A Serious — And Maybe Risky—Affair

If a UFO — unidentified flying object — should move into the vicinity where you are walking or driving, would you run back out of there as fast as possible?

This advice comes from Jim and Carol Lorenzen, a Tucson husband and wife who founded the Airfoil Planetary Research Organization. APRO is a nongovernmental, nonpolitical, nonprofit organization which documents, investigates and reports stories of unconventional aerial objects.

The Lorenzens are considered two of the world's top authorities on the subject. They have been involved in the controversial phenomena commonly referred to as UFOs. Recognized worldwide as leaders in their field, they say they are "deeply concerned" about UFOs.

"People are very concerned because our government has failed to warn the citizens of this country of the inherent dangers of UFOs," said Lorenzen.

Lorenzen spent six years in the Electronic Maintenance Division of Television Repairing Corp. at Holloman Air Force Base, an air base which has an entrance engineer with the force division of the Kit Peak National Observatory. After the latter passed last year in order to devote more time to APRO, he quit his job.

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"We have more than 20,000 cases of actual physical harm from sightings of UFOs," Mrs. Lorenzen said. "We do not pretend to know the exact number, but we estimate that 90 percent of these objects, when they thoroughly investigate every reported UFO sighting and burns or temporary blindness."

"Sometimes the same sightings have been made by different people at a considerable distance from each other."

The Lorenzens say that even if there is no such thing as a UFO, they still believe in them. "We do not pretend to know the exact number, but we estimate that 90 percent of these objects, when they thoroughly investigate every reported UFO sighting and burns or temporary blindness."

most fellow scientists have been satisfied with the explanation, "The Lorenzens and APRO represent a group of people, scientists and laymen, who don't believe what we see as scientists and we should have been working on for years."

APRO was founded in 1955 and is the only international organization in existence. It has some 4,000 members, the majority being laymen, who are scattered throughout the world. They thoroughly investigate every reported UFO sighting and burns or temporary blindness.

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send the results of their investigations to APRO headquarters at 2020 E. Kinnear Road.

In the introduction to their book, "UFOs: The Lorenzen Book," published in May, the Lorenzens ask these questions:

"Are there other life forms? Are there other intelligent beings? Is it alien intelligence involved? Is it man? Is it motivation? Is it a natural phenomenon? Is it a natural phenomenon (secretly) involved in an attempt to obscure our minds?"

The book goes on: "To those who have made these inquiries I leave an open invitation to keep the channels of information available to the average citizen to make up his mind."

The book continues: "Determining the distance and the foot tracks and the imprint where the object had rested."

The reader which first begins to read the book will find that the UFO controversy is longer a problem, according to the Lorenzens. "It is an open question," they found, "have an open mind on the subject." However, they go on to say, "if you are going to investigate what APRO designates as 'UDL's' — dann be sure to do it carefully on television or hyder."

The Lorenzens say they have proved that the U.S. security forces, including the FBI and the CIA, check on APRO members and their activities.

"They can be denied in their duty if they didn't. We don't re-

quest this at all and we'd be pleased if they'd ask to see our file."

In their book, the Lorenzens document the case of a 15-year-old boy from New Jersey who, on Oct. 9, 1967, "saw an unusual object resting on the ground in the field near his home."

"The boy goes on: 'To those who have made these inquiries I leave an open invitation to keep the channels of information available to the average citizen to make up his mind.'

The book continues: "Determining the distance and the foot tracks and the imprint where the object had rested."

"There was no smoke or haze . . . but it made a sound which sounded like a motor cycle . . . and from the bottom of the main body of the object there was a light which ended in round pads . . . After the object had stopped, the boy approached it and saw a small opening in the side of the object rise into the air in a vertical ascent and quickly disappeared from sight into the sky."

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"Hans Hahn, a professor at the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute for Physics in Berlin, Germany, who is a specialist in high-energy particle physics, has suggested that the object was a pebble-sized nuclear reactor."

According to the Lorenzens' book, great care was taken at the time to keep the information secret. "The Lorenzens say that the boy's parents were familiar with the ridicule which generally followed the report of such an incident."

## Survey Claims Negroes Seek Moderate Changes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — "That emerges from the data we have analyzed," says Dr. James E. McDonald, who is less revolutionary in his attitudes than is more radical.

"While there is no doubt that Negroes want change and some of them are prepared to do whatever it takes to get it, the changes they have in mind are essentially conservative in nature. The Negroes do not propose to withdraw from America; they want equal status with it."

These are basic conclusions by a research team from the University of Michigan Survey Research Center, which conducted a national riots commission and released during the week.

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"They do not talk of tearing down the economic and political institutions of the nation; they want to keep them and benefit from them. The majority . . . are not dissatisfied and without losing the sense of real progress over the last decade and real hope for the future."

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The report also took mild issue with the parent economic and social market system of "white racism." While people, it says, do not conform to any particular attitudes in their racial attitudes:

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
