Customs Met 214 Million Entering U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Nearly 214 million persons - an influx greater than the nation's population - entered the United States in the fiscal year which ended June 30, the Bureau of Customs reported today.

American travelers returning from abroad, foreign visitors and persons shuttling between nations were in the stream of arrivals, up 5.8 per cent from the previous year's total of 202 million.

Commissioner of Customs Lester D. Johnson reported customs collections totaled \$2.9 billion, an increase of 8.4 per cent.

He urged Congress to establish and support a "UFO board of scientific inquiry" to sponsor a variety of investigations along with an "international clearing house" to correlate reports of UFO sightings from around the world.

The scientists testified at a symposium on UFOs sponsored by the House Committee on Science and Astronautics.

Noting UFO sightings by responsible and skeptical witnesses around the world, McDonald said: "Far too many defy our best analysis."

He said these included some cases where witnesses on the ground flashed lights into a pattern of hovering, disc-like craft which responded with flashing lights in the same pattern.

"It would be terrible if this surveillance and was technology was represented by the Everready flashlight."

McDonald also said there were many UFO sightings reported up and down the Eastern Seaboard around the time of the Northeast power blackout in late 1965.

Since the cause of the power pulse which precipitated the blackout has never been identified, McDonald said "there is a tion.

For the time being, Sagan on said, he would favor concentrating on radio astronomy and on ni probes to find out whether any R life exists on neighboring planets.

McDonald said if the Earth was being watched from space, it was being done by a society so advanced that to Earthmen technology "would indistinguishable from magic."

He said he had spent the last two years studying UFOs under a grant from the U.S. Office of Naval Research, spending several months in Australia, New Zealand and Tasmania tracking down sightings.

He said there were a series of 'impressive sightings" last fall in Straffordshire, England, from 'no-nonsense people who were not simply having hallucinations."

Venus May Have our Rugged Terrain

WASHINGTON (UPI) dar pulses beamed from Goldstone Calif., have turned up evidence that the planet Venus may have mountain ranges, craters or fields of boulders.

The report on the rugged terrain was released during the weekend by the National Aeronautics and Space Administra-
